FR DAVID'S GOSPEL REFLECTION: Mark 10: 17-30 consists of three sections that deals with various aspects of riches and poverty. The first section portrays riches as an obstacle to discipleship. A man approaches Jesus and asks what he needs to do to inherit eternal life. Jesus tells him to keep the biblical commandments. When the man claims to have kept them since his youth, Jesus' mood changes from a testy defensiveness ("Why do you call me good?") to genuine affection. And so he issues an invitation to the man to become his disciple. But this will involve selling his possessions and giving the money to the poor. Only at the end do we learn that the man is rich and so does not accept Jesus' call. The second section alludes to the privileged spiritual position of the economically poor by reflecting on how hard it is for the rich to enter God's Kingdom. This teaching puzzles the disciples, since they most likely regarded wealth as a blessing from God. The "camel through the eye of the needle" analogy suggests that it is almost impossible for the rich to enter God's Kingdom, though shortly afterward Jesus acknowledges that for God all things are possible. The third section promises great rewards to those who give up their families and possessions to follow Jesus. In response to Peter's question, Jesus assures those who give up these things for "the sake of the gospel" will receive even larger families and possessions in this age and eternal life in the age to come. He does, however, inject a sobering note into the list by the inclusion of the phrase "not without persecutions." This week it may be worth reflecting on the ways our culture can distort our values in regard to our many possessions.

BISHOP MARK'S PASTORAL LETTER this Sunday is 'On the threat of Assisted Suicide.' Bishop Mark writes "It is part of the urgent response we must now make to the prospect of assisted suicide being agreed in principle by parliament in a matter of weeks. In the brevity of such a letter I have set out the Christian teaching which has guided our nation from its beginning in the care of the sick and the most vulnerable; pointed to the enormous dangers of embarking on the road of medically assisted suicide/killing; and have asked the faithful to write urgently to their Members of Parliament to urge opposition to this proposal and greater support for palliative care. We can be assured that such efforts do make a difference. I will keep you informed of any major developments and in the meantime our own Father Martin Onuoha has written a helpful book "Life is Always Worth Living: Assisted Dying or Living?" and the Catholic Union of Great Britain has also highlighted a documentary written and presented by Liz Carr entitled "Better Off Dead" on BBC1 and iPlayer."
